Solar Energy Initiatives by the University The major buildings of Mahatma Gandhi University have installed roof-top solar panels. Solar energy is used, and it is linked to the power grid. At present, a total of eight buildings in the campus like Administrative block, library, various Schools like Chemical Sciences, Environmental Sciences, Management and Business studies, Computer Sciences, Behavioural Sciences and Pure and applied physics are installed with roof top solar panels. The details are as follows: • Roof-top solar-powered generators for 400 KWP were installed in the campus with an investment of Rs. 350 lakhs under RUSA Phase I. • The grid connectivity with Kerala State Electricity Board has been completed and in favourable conditions the savings for the university on the power front are in the range of Rs. 6-7 lakh. • This innovative system helped to produce 1600-2100 units of electricity per day from its eight buildings. Solar power systems will be eventually extended to all buildings of the University.

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7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

University's environmental policy is aimed at achieving a green and sustainable environment. Reduced the use of non-renewable sources of energy and increased the use of renewable sources of energy especially solar power. • Significant amount is spent on protection of 12 Hectares of land (28 acres) rich in

biodiversity as "Jeevaka Live Laboratory" (untouched virgin land) in the campus. Significant amount was also spent for diversion of rooftop rain water from all buildings (14 nos) to Ravindra Sarovar - an abandoned quarry turned water storing pond in the campus to store 42.5 million litres of pure water which is sufficient for meeting the water requirements for a year. Substantial amount was spent on protection of all watershed areas, well recharging, construction of check dams, conversion of traditional bulbs to energy efficient LED bulbs, procurement of battery operated vehicle, construction of rainwater harvesting tanks, procurement of air quality monitoring vehicle etc. Framed and implemented the green policies on water conservation, biodiversity protection, energy use and waste management. An eco-friendly battery operated vehicle is in in-house operation. Cutting of trees is restricted in the campus. Under unavoidable circumstances, tree cutting will be permitted only with the approval of CACTS (Campus Advisory Committee on Tree Saving) by planting equal number of tree saplings.

The University has disabled-friendly and barrier-free environment. Ramps, Battery operated vehicles, wheel chairs, special toilets etc are provided for Divyangs. Rainwater has been collected and utilised for laboratory purposes especially to produce distilled water. This can save a good amount of drinking water. Ponds, Pits are used for the conservation of rain water. A quarry has been shaped into a large water conservation facility, namely, Raveendra Sarovar.

Mahatma Gandhi University envisions to excel in the field of higher education and cater to the scholastic and developmental needs of the individual, through continuous creation of critical knowledge base for the society's sustained and inclusive growth. Since the University is a public funded system, the issues of the stakeholders are of prime concern. COVID-19 is a serious threat to humanity, the University has extended all of its sophisticated analytical laboratory facilities to fight against COVID-19. The IUCBRSSH of University has approved as a COVID 19 testing centre by the Govt. of Kerala and ICMR/DHR in March 2020 since the institute was already equipped with all the facilities including high end equipment required for the RT-PCR testing. COVID19 patient samples testing started from 29 March 2020 and several samples have been tested during the assessment period. However, as on Aug 31, 2021 more than 3,00,000 samples have been tested (from 27 March 2020) and results were disseminated within 24 hours of receipt of samples in the centre. The Laboratory works in 3 shifts 24 x 7 in support of Govt. of Kerala to break the chain of COVID-19. Among the State universities in Kerala, IUCBRSSH under Mahatma Gandhi University is the only ICMR and Govt of Kerala approved COVID19 testing centre. University has given utmost priority to fight against COVID -19 not only by providing laboratory facilities but with manufacturing and supply of hand sanitizers, awareness creation (online media) etc. Experienced researchers were engaged in the COVID -19 test (PCR Facility) at Government Medical College, Kottayam. Additionally University has given required relaxation for its students for paying various fees, examination schedule and pattern, online

examination and viva voce, extension of research period, examination centre allotted for students in their home district (examinations were conducted in Lakshadweep also) etc. All these activities are being monitored precisely in an academic point of view for the creation of new knowledge for the sustained growth and well being of the society.
